





## 2017 Director's Report

### 2017 Annual Report

TO: Ohio General Assembly of the Church of God  
FROM: Dr. Esther Cottrell, State Pastor and Director of Ministries  
DATE: October 26, 2017

2017 has been an amazing year as we have ministered together for the expansion of the Kingdom as we lift up Jesus as Lord. Indeed, as you read this report, my prayer is that you will see the fingerprints of Jesus across the page. In just a few days we will mark the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Great Reformation begun when Martin Luther dared to challenge the standard practices in favor of what he saw in scripture to be the God-practices and principles upon which the Church is called to live. One of the key five principles of the Reformation was *solo Christo* (in Christ alone). The Ohio Ministries staff, the Governing Board, state committees and teams and I have worked together this year to be a catalyst and resource to this Assembly and the churches you represent, so that you are encouraged and empowered to be a reformed people proclaiming that Jesus is the subject. It is to Him that all glory and honor go as we work together for His Kingdom sake. It is for Him that we continue to serve a church that is ever re-forming into His likeness and purpose.

### Administrative & Support Services

#### Staffing

*Leadership Focus State Administrator.* Rev. Michael Parks joined our staff this year as our new Leadership Focus State Administrator. Mike brings both a passion for the Leadership Focus program as well as experience working as one of the Leadership Focus Admins at the national level. We are excited to have Mike onboard and look forward to a period of growth and organization in this ministry of preparing a next generation of ordained ministers.

*Camp Business Development Manager.* A couple of weeks ago, we welcomed to our staff, Mrs. Bethanne Martin, our new Camp Business Development Manager. This position was developed through the work of the Camp Master Planning Team and approved by the Governing Board in the May meeting. Bethanne brings a passion for this position and has already been engaging area schools to procure the needed business for summer of 2018. Bethanne is acutely aware that the timeline to move the camp bottom line from a negative financial forecast to a positive one is a primary pressing point. We are pleased and excited to have Bethanne in this new role.

*Finance Director.* When our Finance Director, Robert Fulton, retired as a CFO he saw the opportunity to work with Ohio Ministries as a gift from the Lord. A long-time leader in his local church, Bob had always felt a call from the Lord to help other lay leaders and local churches, especially in his area of expertise, finance. Over the past eleven years Bob has been living out that call as the Finance Director for Ohio Ministries. He has held numerous conferences, private sessions, and fielded hundreds of calls with church treasurers, lay leaders, and pastors to train and inform churches in good financial practices. He has been a gift to the church. Bob plans to retire at the end of the year, though will continue to be available as a consultant. We are a grateful (and hopefully more solvent) Church for his work among us. With Bob's retirement, we are transitioning to a virtual accounting firm to care for our financial needs.



## Financial Information

The Governing Board and staff are committed to being good stewards of the gifts and support that comes to Ohio Ministries. We depend almost solely on the support of the churches in the state. One of the distinctives of the Church of God is that, unlike denominations that have apportionments or fees assessed to every local church, we trust each other to be generous in giving because we value our common vision and mission, believing that we can do better together.

That spirit of generosity has shone brightly as Ohio churches, large and small and in between, have participated in the call to help our sister congregations at Tytus Ave, Middletown, OH and in Missouri, Texas, Florida, and Puerto Rico. As I write this report, over \$34,000 has been received in the Ohio Ministries office. 100% of these funds are being sent to help alleviate suffering due to fire, flood, and/or hurricane damage. For this outpouring of help I am most grateful and proud of our generosity.

I would be remiss, however, if I left you with the impression that the financial health of Ohio Ministries is excellent. While we still have a healthy, positive balance, the truth is that we have been in a seven year slip in giving. Thankfully, the number of churches participating has increased, however, the average gift has decreased by \$100 per year per giving church. Over the course of years this practice has resulted in a decrease in giving of over \$70,000. One doesn't need to be a financial wizard to see that this trend needs to be turned around.

I am praying and believing that you will lead your budget teams this year to increase your giving to the state budget and resist the urge to reduce the giving. We need your partnership and I believe that you need state ministries. Together we are better.

## Governing Board

In an unusual move, the Board lost three members early in the year due to pastoral changes and out-of-state moves. I am so grateful for Steve Rauch, Nancy Blankenship, and Michael Wise who stepped into those vacant spots and stood in the gap this year. Their leadership has been invaluable.

## Camp Marengo and Student Ministries Team

### Summer Youth Camp

Our youth camp directors, Alan and Jessica Smith report a 10% increase in the number of campers this summer for a total of 405 campers. They further report: 57 campers were saved; 126 rededicated their lives; 84 felt call to ministry; 145 want to share Christ in their home and school; 314 want to grow deeper in their faith.

One of the junior staffers, Mattie Watts, testified,

*Being on junior staff this summer was exactly what I needed. Not everything went perfectly but I could not have picked a better group of staff or campers to spend my summer growing with. I learned that ministry was exactly what I wanted to be doing for the rest of my life. I was able to go outside of my introverted shell and become more open about my faith and my testimony. Through spending time with the staff, counselors, and campers I made lifelong friendships and bonds with those I met for the first time and those that I've known for years. Looking back, camp created so many opportunities for growth in my faith. I've begun the process of incorporating it all into my everyday walk with Christ.*

The camping ministry continues to give great results of evangelism and discipleship.



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## Camp Facilities and Master Plan

*The Chapel.* The Chapel on the camp property, once a symbol of the camp, was deemed condemned in 2015. Upon further investigation, it was determined that repair would be quite expensive with estimates of \$50,000 -100,000. Thankfully, a licensed contractor and member of the Disaster Relief Team, Jeremy Tillotson, and a crew of volunteers from the Disaster Relief Team and Ohio Ministries staff were able to deconstruct the building safely and at very little cost, saving Ohio Ministries thousands of dollars.

*Camp Master Planning Team.* A team of lay persons and clergy met six times over this past year to review the needs of the camp and to cast vision for what could be. Early on we affirmed that the chief purpose and mission of Camp Maren-go is to extend and reinforce the local church's ministry of evangelism and discipleship to youth and children. We worked on 5 aspects of camping: facility, financial funding, programming, staffing, and marketing development, creating both short and long term goals for each area. The short-range goal is to update and freshen the facilities, concentrate on expanding the summer program, and bring the camp financial picture from a negative position to a break-even one. We developed the position of Camp Business Development Manager which has been filled with the hiring of Bethanne Martin. The long-range plan is to create and maintain a flagship Christian camp that thrives, not just survives.

I am deeply indebted to Claude Robold, Karen Sullivan, Todd Gindelberger, Steve Rauch and Paula Spears for their work on this project.

## Student Ministries Team

This year the Student Ministries Team has elected to again hold the OSYC at the Maiden Lane Church in Springfield. This will bring significant financial savings as well as to open up options for meetings that are not currently available when renting auditoriums and convention centers. The dates are November 10-12.

## Church Multiplication

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### National Multiplication Initiative

Several state ministries and large church pastors have been working to develop a bold partnership to provide grants and support to plant churches, develop campuses, and re-develop struggling/closed churches across the country using a common strategy and focus. This new initiative has been labeled, *Emerge*. Churches and state ministries are pooling funds to underwrite this initiative which is seeking to make this a 100% pass through project in which all funds go to multiplication projects and administrative costs are managed on a volunteer basis. State ministries are also serving as the leadership team for new projects, providing coaching for new plants and developments as well as additional financial aid when the plant is in our state. Ohio has an opportunity to be a front leader in these efforts. We are currently working and praying with some Ohio churches to consider partnerships and potential opportunities.

### Mid-west Multiplication Initiative

For more than four years Ohio, Indiana and Michigan have been working together to train and support churches and pastors in multiplication efforts: new plants, campuses, and re-development of struggling churches. Over these four years we have worked together to plant 10 new churches/campuses. Additionally, more than 25% of the pastors in these 3 states have participated in training events and conversations around the questions: when and how can we multiply with new disciples and churches? Statistics say that for a church group to survive and maintain influence they must plant at the level of 2.5% annually. We are not there yet, but we are making forward progress.





*Church closings become opportunities for new growth:* There are currently 15 congregations with weekly Sunday attendance below 30. For those congregations to meet the operational needs of current and potential members without doing something radically different is increasingly difficult! I anticipate that the next few years will mark the closing of several of these churches. This forces Ohio Ministries to think strategically, in Kingdom-minded ways, about these assets. One example of this is the unfolding story of Carlisle. In the first quarter of this year, we were notified that the Carlisle Church closed. They have subsequently deeded the property to Ohio Ministries. In conversation with the Monroe First Church, they volunteered to partner with us to form a new campus in that building. As this potential develops, the partnership is transferring from Church Transformation to the Church Multiplication Team.

## Leadership Development

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### Credentials

*Credentials Congress.* Church of God Ministries conducted a second Credentials Congress made up of representatives of all state/regional assemblies in the US to further conversation around issues that surfaced in the congress last year. Ohio was represented by: Jonathan Grubbs, Credentials Chair; Tim Kufeldt, SW Credentials Chair; Chris Cottrell, Central Credentials member; Demetrius Booker, and me.


*Credentials Committee.* In addition to the regular work of this committee to oversee the ordination process as well as deal with issues of ministerial and congregational discipline, the committee has spent considerable time and effort to review the new 2017 edition of the national credentials manual.

### Start Fresh

Realizing that within Ohio we are blessed to have great resources of trained persons leading awesome ministries and realizing that developing lay persons to lead powerful ministries is a vital part of a church's ministry, Demetrius Booker is developing a one day multi-track training to debut in March 2018. The goal of this day is to empower both lay persons and ministers for effective ministry in your community.

### Cluster Groups

We believe that one of the best ways to grow our gifts of leadership and practice unity is in the small group experience. About 20% of pastors have been involved in cluster groups this past year. Others have indicated that they want to get involved in a cluster group. A variety of cluster groups are being formed that will begin with the new year. 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## Church Transformation

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### Covenant Churches

State Associate Pastor Demetrius and a team of coaches have been working with eight congregations this past year to energize them toward missional health and growth. Many of these congregations are seeing fruit as they work together for health and growth, to be Kingdom successful. After 18 months on the job, over 60 church visits, 11 pastoral search team consultations, 8 church consultations, and over 70,000 miles driven, he is getting a good education on what it means to minister in Ohio. Here are some of his reflections:

**We have a desire to do better, produce more and lasting fruit:**

*Everywhere I go, from leaders to their members, they are conscious of where their church is spiritually and though they don't know the lingo, they do know that they are on the down side of their church's life-cycle. Struggling to meet their yearly budgets due to diminishing funds and regular attendees will be the death of many of these congregations. This knowledge is producing a great opportunity for our district and OM to partner with them as they face their uncertain future.*

**We have a desire to be connected to each other (congregations, districts, local and state leaders):**

*The unhealthy balance of extreme autonomous congregations has left many church members and their leaders longing for more fellowship with other similar faith-based organizations. Our "Spring Fling" event for seniors saw a record attendance of pastors and senior adults coming together because they desired the fellowship of believers. Dr. Cottrell's and my preaching schedule and invitations to work with search committees, church leadership teams, and district meetings is allowing us to meet the people and help them understand the church, God's Church, is larger than their local congregations.*

**There is a leadership vacuum in many of our ministries and congregations throughout our 209 congregations:**

*Many of the problems plaguing our congregations is best described as "A Leadership Vacuum". The absence of leadership can be seen in the decisions made and those failed to make. Decisions, or the lack thereof, have left many of our congregations in survival mode. It is my hope that this year's focus on Leadership Development will help reduce this vacuum by focusing on our pastors and also current and future lay leaders.*

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## Pastoral, Congregational, & District Resourcing

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### Missions Team

With a purpose statement to be a catalyst for local congregations to unify around global and local missions, the team sponsored a youth trip to Italy in July. Four students, our team chair, Kyle Hayes, and his wife Jessica, traveled to Italy to learn about ministry in post-Christendom and to help lead a second annual youth camp. It was a life-changing experience for the students as well as the Christians in Italy and the missionary kids that joined the group.



## Disaster Relief Partnership

The Disaster Relief Team has had a busy year addressing needs within and beyond the borders of our state. Volunteers have helped with the dismantling of the outdoor chapel at Camp Marengo and have given three days to help the Lorain Great Lakes Church in securing an indoor worship area. The team has also led the way in collecting offerings for our churches in Missouri, Texas, Florida, and Puerto Rico after natural disasters have struck. Additionally, the team arranged for two trucks of supplies to be sent to Pasadena, Texas via two non-profit organizations; Caring Partners and Enpuzzlement, Inc. Currently, the team is working with Eaton Church and persons from a few other congregations to send a workcamp to Texas to help with clean-up efforts after Hurricane Harvey.

## Emphasis for 2018

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As we gear up for a new year, Ohio Ministries continues to be committed to resourcing, empowering and catalytically leading the Ohio Church of God in the areas of leadership development, church transformation and church multiplication. The focus for the big events in 2018 will emphasize church transformation. With many the churches in Ohio wanting to change their story from decline to growth and health, it is our honor to resource and walk alongside those ready to engage in transformation.

While there are many challenges, the potential for ministry in Ohio among the Church of God and her communities is greater, and the victories are sweeter.

Through the help of God and the outstanding work of you, His people, we will declare and demonstrate to this changing world that we are "Better Together!"



1st term, 3 years







## Church Records 101

*Before you can maintain them, you have to know what they are.*

*Your church possesses the following documents that qualify as “church records.”*

- 1) Articles of Incorporation. If your church is incorporated, the document that you submitted to the secretary of state to become incorporated is known as the Articles of Incorporation (also known as a charter). It is a short document that contains the church’s name, address, period of duration, initial board of directors, and statement of purposes. It is the most authoritative legal document that a church has. In the event of a conflict between the charter and any other church legal document, the charter will control.
- 2) Constitution or bylaws. This is the document that contains most of a church’s rules of internal administration. At a minimum, church bylaws should include: church business meetings; selection and expulsion of members; responsibilities of board members and pastors; methods of amending the bylaws; purchase and conveyance of property; and other matters of organization, discipline, and administration as necessary. Avoid ambiguous language in your bylaws; it can lead to legal trouble.
- 3) Financial records. Church board members owe various fiduciary duties to their church, and these include familiarity with the church’s financial records. It is the church’s responsibility to implement safeguards regarding the handling of contributions and the recording of expenses, as well as to ensure that the church is properly receipting donors for their contributions.
- 4) List of members. Because many churches grant their members the power to decide administrative actions, it is critical for a church to be able to identify those persons who are active voting members. Make sure your church has an up-to-date list and a method for periodically reviewing and updating the list.
- 5) Minutes of membership meetings. Most churches conduct annual business meetings, and occasional special meetings. Maintain records of all such meetings.
- 6) Minutes of board and committee meetings. Churches should maintain a complete set of the minutes of board and committee meetings.
- 7) Insurance policies. Be familiar with where your church’s insurance policies are maintained and what the terms of your policies are. In situations where coverage may be limited (e.g. sexual misconduct), seek additional coverage and work to reduce the risk.
- 8) Tax records. These include payroll tax forms, housing allowance designations, contribution records, and any other forms you have filed with a government tax agency.
- 9) Employment records. These include applications for employment, reference checks, information concerning disciplinary actions, the I-9 immigration form that all employers must maintain for each new employee, and any other document relating to employees.

## 10 Biggest Tax Mistakes

### *10 Biggest Tax Mistakes Made By Congregations*

- 1) **Congregation does not report clergy compensation.** Every congregation is responsible to report clergy taxable compensation to the IRS. A Form W-2 should be used in nearly every instance.
- 2) **Congregation pays or reimburses for out-of-pocket medical expenses without establishing a proper plan.** The selection and adoption of an appropriate plan by the congregation is the starting point for medical expense reimbursements. Different rules govern flexible spending accounts (FSAs), health reimbursement arrangements (HRAs), and Health Savings Accounts (HSAs).
- 3) **Congregation makes payments to clergy investment accounts and the payments are treated as tax-free.** If a congregation remits contributions under a Section 403(b) or 401(k) plans for clergy, these amounts are generally tax-deferred for clergy. However, payments by a congregation to clergy personal investment accounts are fully taxable and should be reported on Form W-2.
- 4) **Congregation reimburses clergy personal commuting miles.** A congregation may reimburse clergy for congregation-related miles (at a maximum rate of 54 cents per mile for 2016). But a congregation should not reimburse personal commuting miles.
- 5) **FICA tax is deducted from clergy salary and matched by the congregation.** All qualified clergy are subject to self-employment social security tax (using Form SE). A congregation should never withhold FICA-type social security tax from clergy pay and match the amount withheld. FICA-type social security only applies to lay employees.
- 6) **Congregation reimburses clergy expenses without adequate documentation.** Clergy expenses should not be reimbursed by a congregation unless they are adequately documented. The why, who, what, when, and where of expenses should be documented.
- 7) **Congregation does not formally designate a housing allowance, but treats clergy as having a proper housing allowance.** Unless a congregation has formally and prospectively designated a housing allowance for clergy, a housing allowance should not be excluded from clergy Form W-2s.
- 8) **Congregation distributes benevolence amounts based solely on donor's designation.** Contributions to a general benevolence fund without a donor's designation of the benevolent recipient generally constitute tax-deductible contributions. However, gifts that are restricted for a particular benevolent recipient are typically not tax deductible.
- 9) **Congregation acknowledges property gifts and values them for the donor.** The donor is always responsible to value any gifts of property (except for certain gifts of autos, boats, or airplanes). A congregation should simply acknowledge a gift of property, identifying the date of the gift and describing the gift without providing valuation data.
- 10) **Congregation receives a gift of services and receipts the gift with a stated dollar amount.** Gifts of services are not tax deductible to the individual who performed the services. While a congregation can express appreciation for gifts of services, receipts should never be issued for them.
